Mad About Reading!

Kindergarten have started reading books on their own this term. We have been using the Initialit program to set a solid foundation for our reading. Be ready for lots of decodable readers to be sent home in homework!



In class, 5/6 have been learning about an extremely special day, which is known as Sorry Day. On the 26th of May each year, we say sorry to the Aboriginal people whose children were torn away from their families. The Aboriginal children were ripped from their families by the government and taken to orphanages, missions and put into foster care as well. These children were known as the stolen generation and were taken by the government because they thought taking them was the right thing to do. They thought the right thing was taking them and making them dress and speak the same language more like the nonindigenous people. This awful tragedy went on for 60 long years, beginning in 1910 all the way through to 1970. Kevin Rudd, one of Australia's previous Prime Ministers, was the first to say sorry to these hurt Aboriginal families. He wanted to make the whole of Australia come together as an equitable country.

Sorry Day is an important day on the Australian calendar. It is held on the 26th of May every year. Sorry Day means many different things to the Indigenous people. It is a day where we as a country remember the Stolen Generation. The Stolen Generation was when indigenous children were taken from their families against their will. Mabo day is held annually on the 3rd of June and remembers Eddie Mabo's success when he fought for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander land rights. Eddie fought for those rights for 10 years ending up winning in the high court of Australia but tragically he lost his life to cancer when he was 55 before he could see his victory. Eddie Mabo was born and grew up on Mer Island in the Torres Strait Islands, just north of Cape York. Eddie Mabo will be remembered by many Australians both Indigenous and non-Indigenous as a hero.
